### FEBRUARY ACTIVITY REPORT

A small group of 4 people met to remove wire tree guards from mature trees at the far end of Braniffs road. Conditions were hot and dusty, with tile temperature well into the 30's and the humidity very high. All present were very careful to give snakes a fair warning they were approaching as the grass was very high in some areas. A combination of wire cutters, gloves and brute strength were required to remove the wire guards and we are very thankful that they are no longer used in the park. The trailer was full when the group finished up 2 hrs later, although some guards around trees close to the creek have not been removed due to layers of dirt which have built up around the base. These will require digging out at a later date, when the weather is much cooler.

The highlight of the day was the sighting of a koala in a young tree perched very close to the ground at eye level. The koala had positioned itself to take advantage of any breeze with arms draped over very small branches and legs hanging down, it looked a picture of relaxation. .

I finished the day with a very nice dip in the creek which was very very cool after the hot work but refreshing. I can highly recommend it as a part of our summer activities, a dip in the creek that is, not wire tree guard removal!!!

Parks Victoria will administer the program and will formally contact us later about relevant grant agreements etc.

Our thanks go to Anne Bailey (who put in a lot of her own time working on the application for the grant) and to the rest of the committee who also met regularly last year to finalise details for the grant application.

I hope to have more information on this in the next few months.

### **FRIENDS OF THE NORTH ARM.(F.O.N.A.)**

Late January a visit to Lakes Entrance was highlighted by an excursion with the Friends group up the North Arm on the "Bluebird". These trips ran twice a day and were extemely popular with many people being turned away, the boat was full !!! The original vegetation surrounding the North Ann was warm temperate rainforest, with swamp paperbark and sea rush around the shoreline and creekbeds. A combination of the opening of the artificial entrance in 1889, developement by selectors who cleared timber and grazed cattle to the present day housing developement have had a devastating impact on the pristine environment.

It was wonderfull to see what it must have been originally like as we travelled further up North Arm with pockets of natural vegetation and glimpses of the bird life including a sea Eagle soaring high over the waterways. The F.O.N.A was formed in 1995 and has recently released the "North Arm Foreshore and Estuary Plan" in partnership with the East Gippsland Shire Council and the Dept of Natural Resources. All those who travel on the "Bluebird" were given the opportunity to provide written comment on the environmental future of the North Arm.

It was an opportunity to provide support and encouragement to a group of like-minded people who are facing a huge task of challenging and changing the current management of the North Arm. If you are in Lakes Entrance I would encourage you to contact F.O.N.A. and travel up the waterway. For your interest rare species growing in the North Arm are :
